





#### Police-Free Schools Complex

"What I call the #PoliceFreeSchoolsComplex, is based in the reality and recurring pattern that many educational spaces attempt to legitimize themselves for solely enacting the (initial) removal of their original police-in-school program meanwhile leaving root issues intact and as a result perpetuating harm."

#### Cooptation of the original call for Police-Free Schools

- Solely equate this call with the act of removing police(ing)-in-school programs
- Educational spaces are not doing the ongoing critical work that communities have been demanding
- Educational spaces that have never had a police(ing)-in-school program and claim that they are "Police-Free Schools"
- The removal of police(ing)-in-school programs across all educational levels including post-secondary institutions has always been a first and necessary step on a larger journey of liberatory education



#### This is Why We Say Policing-Free Schools!

- A tactic to combat co-optation
- A rallying call and affirmation
- Directly recognizes and orients us towards action around the reality that policing and carcerality operate in a myriad of ways in educational spaces
- Expansion of police(ing)-in-schools, moves beyond solely a police-in-school program, it extends to anything that would otherwise expand police presence, policing and carceral measures in educational spaces



# Departing from the Pipeline Metaphor To the School-Prison Nexus

- Erica Meiners, one of the earliest scholars to propose the use of the nexus metaphor, describes that, "*linkages between schools and jails are less a pipeline, more a persistent nexus or a web of intertwined, punitive threads*" (Meiners, 2007, p. 31).
- "The tentacles in policies, practices, and informal knowledges that support, naturalize and extend relationships between incarceration and schools" (Meiners, 2007, p. 4)
- Linkages of education and criminal punishment systems as a nexus more accurately encompasses the "historic, systematic, and multifaceted nature" of these linkages (Meiners, 2007, p. 32).

- The nexus explicitly recognizes the interconnected system of power that exists through a "network of institutions, policies, practices, and ideologies" (Conner & Rosen, 2016, p. 94) that in which "operate in collusion to exclude, control, disenfranchise, and oppress" (Nuñez-Eddy, p. 119).
- Theorizes schools and the criminal punishment system as fundamentally and symbiotically linked - the nexus names the connection between schools and other systems that treat Black and Brown people as disposable
- School-Prison Nexus deep relationship between schools and prisons in infrastructure, policies and practices that is grounded in the entrenchment of White Supremacy and carceral-cultural control in educational spaces (Rodríguez 2010; Stovall 2018)





#### No To Replication of Harm: Reformist Reforms

- Increase of police(ing)-in-schools through other means:
  - Any form of expansion, increase and/or entrenchment of police at schools or school-related activities
- Reformist Reforms to Original Police-in-School Programs such as:
  - Creation of a "new" program
  - Creation of a School-Police Department
  - Creation of a Police-led or collaborative school
  - Renaming / rebranding / revising / reimagining / updating
  - Changes to its composition:
    - less number of police

    - additional trainings



# ONDP MPP Jill Andrew Tabled Petitions: Policing-Free Schools

### MANDATE THE REMOVAL OF POLICE-IN-SCHOOL PROGRAMS & POLICING-IN-SCHOOL PROGRAMS FROM EDUCATIONAL SPACES IN ONTARIO

PETITION TO THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF ONTARIO:

WHEREAS there is little to no evidence that police-in-school programs and policing-in-school programs prevents or reduces violence in educational spaces and there is no evidence to support the notion that these programs make educational spaces safer

WHEREAS there is ample evidence of the detrimental negative impacts of police-in-school programs and policing-in-school programs on students and particularly impacts Black, Indigenous, racialized, 2SLGBTQQIA+, disabled, neurodivergent, students with precarious immigration status and including intersecting identities

WHEREAS equitable access to education is a human right and structures of policing impede this access including police-in-school programs and policing-in-school programs

WHEREAS students' learning conditions are workers' working conditions and what research shows is that smaller classroom sizes, ample supports and resources including but not limited to increase in teachers, education workers, educational assistants, support staff, mental health supports, wrap-around services, before- and after-school programming, school food programs, clean water, clean air, alongside addressing root causes, addressing social and structural determinants of health and equity is what creates healthy educational spaces—which in and of themselves are safe and co-creates conditions for students' wellbeing and academic excellence

WHEREAS multiple School Boards here in Ontario have removed their police-in-school programs including: Toronto District School Board, Hamilton Wentworth District School Board, Ottawa Carleton District School Board among others and post-secondary institution, such as the Toronto Metropolitan University did not move forward with introducing a policing-in-school program, the Campus Special Constables program

WHEREAS this is not an isolated issue but rather this is a systemic issue under provincial jurisdiction and the Ontario Government states that they are committed to "increase accountability and standardize commitments for advancing human rights and equity across the education system"

THEREFORE WE THE UNDERSIGNED PETITION THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF ONTARIO TO: mandate the immediate removal of all and any type of police-in-school programs and policing-in-school programs across all educational levels (K-12 and post-secondary institutions) as a first and necessary step moving towards a policing-free schools Ontario.

#### MANDATE THE REMOVAL OF POLICING, CARCERAL & PUNITIVE APPROACHES FROM EDUCATIONAL SPACES IN ONTARIO

PETITION TO THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF ONTARIO

WHEREAS equitable access to education is a human right and structures of policing and carcerality impede this access; and taking into account that there are multiple ways that policing and carcerality show up within educational spaces beyond police presence and police(ing)-in-school programs, including punitive disciplinary practices, exclusionary discipline, isolation, time-outs, seclusion and restraint, corporal punishment, limitations imposed on and challenges to bodily autonomy, streaming among many others

WHEREAS there is ample evidence of the detrimental negative impacts on students and particularly Black, Indigenous, racialized, 2SLGBTQQIA+, disabled, neurodivergent, students with precarious immigration status and including intersecting identities

WHEREAS evidence has shown punitive approaches cause adverse effects and are not in alignment with evidence-based applied educational neuroscience framework and is not conducive to students' wellbeing and academic excellence



# Bill 33: 'Supporting Children and Students Act, 2025'



### Bill 33 - 'Supporting Children and Students Act, 2025' Amendments to Education Act

#### SCHEDULE 2 EDUCATION ACT

The Schedule makes various amendments to the Education Act, including the following:

- 1. The Act currently includes provisions setting out specific situations when there may be an investigation of a board's affairs. Amendments provide that, instead, an investigation may be directed if the Minister has concerns about a matter of public interest. Matters of public interest include whether boards, board members and directors of education are carrying out their duties under this Act in an appropriate manner. Provisions are included that address the powers of investigators and possible actions that may be taken after an investigation.
- 2. Amendments provide that the Minister may give directions to the board to address a matter of public interest if, in the Minister's opinion, a board, board member or director of education has done or omitted to do something, or is likely to do or omit to do something, that could affect a matter of public interest. Control and charge of a board may be vested in the Minister if a board does not comply with a Minister's direction, or in certain other circumstances. Currently, such vesting orders must be made by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.
- Currently the Act requires boards to have external auditors and audit committees. The Act is amended to also provide for Ministry auditors and internal auditors, and to make related amendments.
- The Minister is given power to establish policies and guidelines respecting school board expense policies.
- A requirement is added for boards to work with local police services to provide them with access to school premises, permit them to participate in school programs and implement school resource officer programs.
- 6. A new section requires boards to apply to the Minister for approval of the name of a new school or to change the name of an existing school. Provisions are included respecting the approval process and what the board may do upon approval or rejection of a name.
- Related regulation-making powers are included.







Today we write in solidarity with our partner, Policing-Free Schools (Canada), and their work to dismantle harmful policing practices in schools and promote safe, supportive educational environments for all students. The work of Policing-Free Schools (Canada) is crucial, especially because these are systemic issues that have been harming student experiences for decades, not just in the U.S., but also in Canada and around the world.

In addition to supporting Policing-Free Schools, the National Campaign for Policing-Free Schools Canada and the Provincial Campaign for Policing-Free Schools Ontario, the Advancement Project also opposes Ontario Bill 33. This proposed amendment to the Education Act purports to address school board accountability, transparency, safety, and rights. But in reality, this broad legislation would centralize police power by giving police greater authority over school boards—effectively mandating policing-in-schools across the province against the will of students, parents, and school communities. Provincial Campaign for Policing-Free Schools Ontario is committed to stopping this dangerous legislation by growing their coalition network of Ontario-based partners, organizers, and groups working to remove police from schools and continue their ongoing work beyond Bill 33 for fully funding public education and the elimination of policing and criminalization from education spaces. Solidarity Statement in Support of Policing-Free Schools and Opposition to Ontario's Bill 33

We are writing to express strong solidarity with our partner Policing-Free Schools (Canada) and the broader coalition network of Ontario-based partners: individuals, collectives and organizations that make up the Provincial Campaign for a Policing-Free Schools Ontario supported by the National Campaign in resisting Ontario's Bill 33 – a proposed piece of legislation that would mandate the presence of police officers and policing-in-schools across the province

We write as members of the Northern Police Monitoring Project (NPMP) and Kids of Colour (KoC), two UK-based organisations committed to racial justice, education and youth justice organising, and community care. Together, we co-founded the *No Police in Schools* campaign in Greater Manchester. This campaign emerged in collaboration with young people, parents and carers, youth workers, educators, counsellors, academics, and wider community members who came together out of deep concern about the harms of policing in and around schools.

Our concerns are rooted in lived experience and extensive research. We know that the presence of police in schools contributes to the stigmatisation and criminalisation of young people, particularly Black and racially minoritised students, those with special educational needs, and those living in poverty. It reinforces institutional racism, exposes young people to surveillance and violence, and shifts schools away from positive, caring and inclusive approaches and towards punishment and exclusion. We believe that schools should be sites of safety, creativity and possibility — not pathways to the prison system.

We have had the privilege of working alongside Policing-Free Schools, and it is clear that the dangers posed by policing in schools in the UK are also very real dangers across Canada including in Ontario. This is why we share with Policing-Free Schools a deep commitment to futures rooted in care and transformative justice. We believe that for young people to thrive in schools, to experience true safety and wellbeing, punitive systems must be dismantled and structures rooted in care, accountability, and community support must be built in their place. Their organising has been an inspiration, and we unequivocally support their call to oppose Bill 33. Mandating police presence in schools is a dangerous and retrogressive move — one that flies in the face of the evidence, the demands of young people, and the principles of equity and care.

We urge Ontario-based organisations and individuals to join us in taking a stand. Let us collectively resist criminalisation, and instead work together to build educational environments

Statement in solidarity with Policing-Free Schools (Canada) in opposition to Ontario's

We write to express our firm solidarity with Policing-Free Schools and the broader coalition of partners in their campaign against Bill 33.

Bottomup is a Cape Town-based youth organisation committed to critical and popular education with high school students and representative councils of learners. Our praxis centers on critical education, equipping young people with analytical tools to understand and dismantle systemic injustices. Drawing inspiration from our local tradition of 'education for people's power', we understand education as fundamental to building collective agency for social transformation. We therefore stand in firm support of Policing-Free Schools (Canada) against institutional infrastructures that criminalise students and militarise educational spaces.

We affirm our solidarity with the Provincial Campaign for Policing-Free Schools Ontario and its coalition of Ontario-based partners that include concerned people, community organisers and organisations that are fighting for the removal of police from schools, as a step toward removing the many strands of carceral continuum and the prison industrial complex that have been woven into schools. The carceral logics embedded in school policing are not aberrations but logical extensions of racial-capitalism and colonial violence. Extensive research demonstrates that these practices systematically target Black, indigenous, and racialised youth, reproducing the very structures of harm they purport to address.

Ontario's Bill 33 mandates policing in schools, requiring every school board to: (a) provide police access to school premises, (b) facilitate police participation in educational programming, and (c) implement School Resource Officer (SRO) programs where available. In addition, the legislation centralises regulatory authority with the Lieutenant Governor in Council to i) make regulations about how school boards must work with local police services, ii) prescribe the circumstances under which boards must provide access to schools and iii) to prescribe the circumstances under which school boards must implement SRO programmes. In effect, this undermines the voices of students, families, and communities most affected by these policies.

Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand Scholars and Advocates Expressing solidarity with Policing-Free Schools, the National and Ontario Provincial Campaign for Policing-Free Schools and opposition to Ontario Bill 33

We write to express our deepest solidarity with the Provincial Campaign for Policing-Free Schools Ontario, its partner organizations, and the many students, families, communities and labour unions united against Ontario's proposed Bill 33.

As researchers exploring non-policing and non-carceral alternatives to school exclusion and the school-prison nexus in Australia and Aotearoa New Zealand, we have seen firsthand the harms of exclusionary and punitive practices in education systems. Research shows that suspensions, expulsions, and school-based policing do not promote safety or inclusion. Instead, they disproportionately harm marginalised students, particularly Indigenous and other racialised students, and students with disabilities, entrenching cycles of criminalisation, and deepening inequalities.

Punitive approaches such as school policing shift schools away from being sites of care, growth, and opportunity, and instead reproduce dynamics of exclusion and punishment. Research shows that removing students from learning environments does not address underlying issues of distress, disengagement or disruption, much less contribute to improved wellbeing or behaviour. Rather, exclusion is a predictor of further exclusion, and when coupled with police presence in schools, contributes to young people's surveillance, criminalisation, and pathways into the criminal punishment system.

Around the world, there is little evidence that police in schools improve student safety or improve school discipline cultures (Brady et al., 2007), and evidence that their presence can lead to criminalisation of students (Mallett, 2022; Samuels-Wortley et al., 2021; Sorenson, 2022). In contrast, there is strong evidence for alternatives to police, such as targeted school-level resourcing for services such as restorative programs and mental health support (Fronius et al., 2019; Hollands et al., 2022; Lodi, 2022). These can reduce exclusions, reduce criminalisation and even reduce the long-term state cost burden of criminalisation and imprisonment (Jones et al., 2023). Expanding police and policing-in-schools through Bill 33 would ignore this evidence and exacerbate the harms of school-based policing.

It is with this knowledge and international perspective that we unequivocally support the call to oppose Bill 33. Mandating policing-in-schools runs directly counter to the evidence, to the demands of young people, and to the values of equity, safety, and community care. Ontario should be investing in resources that strengthen student inclusion, culturally safe approaches to wellbeing, and supports for teachers, rather than funnelling young people into punitive systems.

We are in solidarity with Policing-Free Schools Canada, the National Campaign and the Provincial Campaign for Policing-Free Schools Ontario, alongside all those working to create learning environments free from policing and carceral measures and rich with possibilities for dignity and thriving.


